## K-10 Connector Survey interim report



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## Executive Summary

A total of 479 people answered the survey that was conducted on November $13^{\text {th }}$ and November $18^{\text {th }}$ through the $22^{\text {nd }}$. From the 479 surveys, 414 ( $86 \%$ ) were students and 33 were faculty at the University of Kansas (KU) or Johnson County Community College (JCCC). Out of the 447 respondents that go to work or school at JCCC or KU, 239 (53\%) were affiliated with KU, and 194 (43\%) were students or faculty at JCCC. The survey found a total of 170 JCCC students/faculty/staff that live in Lawrence and 130 KU students/faculty/staff that live in Overland Park that use the K-10 connector on a regular basis. It is estimated that around 26\% of riders answered the survey. Taking into account the response rate and the data gathered from the survey it can be concluded that most riders of this service are students/faculty or staff whose destination is JCCC or KU. Though the survey shows that the majority of respondents were affiliated with KU, it can be estimated that JCCC and KU attract about $50 \%$ each of riders. This point is further reinforced by the fact that surveyors noted that the JCCC stop was the busiest stop along the route.

## Introduction

The K-10 Connector was surveyed on Wednesday, November $13^{\text {th }}$ and the week of November $18^{\text {th }}$ through the $22^{\text {nd }}$. The team of 4 students surveyed a total of 80 trips; 40 eastbound trips and 40 westbound trips. Table 1 shows the departure times for each trip and the days that they were surveyed.

Table 1 points out that the trips that were surveyed the most are in the afternoon and evening. The bus departing at 5:05 pm is usually full of students getting out of school. There were a total of 479 surveys filled out. The team noted that a total of 809 people didn't want to take the survey and there were 208 occasions were the person claimed that they already took the survey. This means that 32 percent of people asked responded to the survey. The percentage might be somewhat overestimated because a head count of all passengers on the bus was not annotated by all surveyors. Where surveyors kept a count of the passengers boarding and alighting, the response rate was 26 percent.

## Preliminary Survey results

The following subjections show the answer rates in to each question on the survey.

## Question 1: What city do you live in?

A total of 18 cities were answered, and two respondents chose to not answer the question. Table 2 shows the most common answers given by respondents.

In addition to the cities in Table 2, cities that passengers come from are: Lenexa, Baldwin, DeSoto, Eudora, Gardner, Leawood, Marion, Merriam, Oskaloosa, Ottawa, Stillwel, and Westwood.

## Question 2: What is your zip code?

Only 11 out of the 479 respondents didn't answer this question, and there were a total of 43 different zip codes written down by surveyors.

## Question 3: Which of the following best describes you?

Most of the respondents described themselves as full-time students. When a survey respondent answered that they were attending both KU and JCCC, the surveyors noted them as part-time students for both schools. Figure 1 shows the overall numbers for each answer.

From Figure 1 it can be seen that about as many faculty (33) were surveyed as people who claimed other (32). When surveyors marked other, 23 respondents did not specify what describes them, 4 respondents said that they use it for work but they don't work for either KU or JCCC, and 5 were using the bus for social visits. Figure 2 shows the institution that students/faculty were associated.

From Figure 2 it can be noted that most of the people surveyed were associated with KU, whether they were faculty, staff, or students. The 10 respondents that were marked as both were students that were taking classes at both schools.

Question 4: Where were you coming from when you boarded this bus?
Table 3 shows where people were coming from when they boarded the bus.

As Table 3 shows, most people were coming from home or school at the time that they were surveyed.

## Question 5: Where did you board this bus?

The following table shows were the people surveyed boarded the bus.

Johnson County Community College was the stop where most surveyed respondents boarded the bus. Most of the respondents whose first trip of the day started at JCCC drove their car to the stop. Table 5 in the next subsection refers to how people go to their stop. The KU-Lawrence stop refers to the Park and Ride Lot at the KU campus.

## Question 6: How did you get to this bus?

Table 5 shows how respondents got to their stop.

Most people drove, or were dropped off before boarding. Out of the 59 people that rode a bus to get to their stop; 47 rode the 41 Park and Ride, 2 rode the 42.1 rode route 11,6 used a JC metro route, and 2 did not specify which bus. Out of the two that didn't specify which bus they used, 1 boarded at the JCCC, and the other boarded at the KULawrence stop. Most of the people that walked to the stop were coming from school going home, and they boarded at the $19^{\text {th }}$ and Naismith stop or the JCCC stop. Most of the people that drove the car boarded at JCCC, $23^{\text {rd }}$ and Naismith, or $19^{\text {th }}$ and Haskell. More specific numbers can be looked up if this is a point of interest.

## Question 7: Where will you get off this bus?

The following table shows were people was planning to alight the bus.

The JCCC and KU-Lawrence stop is where most travelers answered that they were getting off.

## Question 8: After getting off this bus, how will you get to your final

 destination?The following table shows how respondents were planning to get to their final destination.

Almost all people that were driving or riding a car to get to their final destination were coming from school or work, and their destination was home. Most people that were walking to their destination were alighting at JCCC and walking to class. Exact numbers can be looked up if this is a point of interest.

## Question 9: Where are you going?

The following table shows the purpose of the trip.

Most respondents were going home or to school when surveyed. There 3 people that responded "other" were visiting family or loved ones.

## Question 10: How often do you ride the K-10 Connector?

The following table shows how often respondents ride the K-10 Connector.

It must be noted that on occasion when a student was being surveyed, they pointed out that usage depended on class schedule. If the classes that they were taking had to be attended once or twice a week then their usage of the K-10 connector would be reduced for that semester.

## Conclusion

Though not all trips were able to be surveyed every day, more than half were boarded by surveyors. Specific numbers can be reduced according to the questions raised by us or our committees. This report only shows the general numbers and percentages to each question.
