

Sports Pavilion Lawrence Opening Soon

New recreation center opening this fall with a full line-up of classes and programming for all ages.

Sports Pavilion Lawrence, the community's newest city recreation center opens this fall. This new facility will expand the ability for Lawrence Parks and Recreation to offer programming, recreation instruction and general activities for everyone in the Lawrence community. New classes have been added at the recreation center and will provide additional gymnasium space for the community as well as opportunities to host athletic tournaments by both in-town and out-of-town groups.

Sports Pavilion Lawrence is located in northwest Lawrence and is part of the development at Rock Chalk Park. Rock Chalk Park is approximately 89-acres that houses the city's recreation center and new athletic facilities owned by Kansas Athletics, including new collegiate soccer, softball and track-and-field stadiums.

The new recreation center is 181,000-square-foot featuring eight full-size gymnasiums that can accommodate eight full-size basketball courts or 16 full-size volleyball courts. In addition, the facility has an indoor soccer/sports arena, an 1/8-mile indoor walking/jogging track, a cardio/weight area and meeting rooms.

The city designed the building to capitalize on the need for recreational and athletic facilities in Lawrence and surrounding areas. Sports Pavilion Lawrence is poised to become a premier sporting destination for local, regional and national activities and events.

Sports Pavilion Lawrence will also house a network of outdoor walking/jogging trails and outdoor, lighted tennis courts.

City Focusing on Rental Licensing Program

The City of Lawrence cares about our residents and wants to ensure conditions in homes are safe and habitable. While rental units located in the RS-zoned districts are transitioning to the new program now, starting in January 2015, all rental units in Lawrence, regardless of zoning, are required to obtain a rental license and are subject to periodic inspections per the schedule found in the City Code.

As a tenant, we want you to be informed about the Rental Licensing and Inspection Program and how the program will affect you. The Rental Licensing and Inspection Program requires interior and exterior inspections to ensure properties meet Rental Licensing Program guidelines. Tenants with safety concerns can contact the city to request an inspection. Tenants should work with the landlord first to provide the opportunity to correct concerns. Curb It With Blue!

Citywide Recycling Collection Begins October 21 in Lawrence Neighborhoods

October 21 marks the first day of collection for the city's new residential single-stream recycling service for single-family and multi-family residences. The new recycling program adds to the list of services the Solid Waste Division provides through the city's integrated solid waste management system: a comprehensive waste prevention, recycling, composting, and disposal program.

For single-family homes with recycling cart service, below are a few guidelines for collection:

- Rinse food residue off all recyclables, make sure paper is dry, and flatten chipboard and cardboard boxes.
- Set out permitted recyclables in the blue recycling cart provided by the city by 7:00 a.m. on your designated trash collection day. Recycling collection will occur every other week.
- Place wheeled cart at the curb or along the alley with the handle pointing towards your residence. Do not block the sidewalk or driveway. Maintain a clear path to the cart and keep cart at least 3 feet away from other carts, mailboxes, low hanging tree branches, parked cars, or utility poles so trucks can easily access the cart.
- Remove empty carts from the curb within 24 hours.

Recycling dumpsters will be available at participating apartment complexes and other multi-family dwellings.

The initial roll-out of recycling carts will be for 95-gallon carts only. For customers with special needs requesting a smaller cart or customers requesting an additional 95-gallon recycling cart, please complete the online form at www.lawrenceks.org/swm or contact the Solid Waste Division at solidwaste@lawrenceks.org or (785) 832-3032.

Recycling carts are the property of the city and each cart should stay at the address to which it was delivered. The city is responsible for the maintenance and repair of the recycling carts. However, the city will charge the owner or occupant a fee for any necessary repair or replacement due to the owner's or occupant's abuse, misuse or neglect of the cart. The replacement fee for each recycling cart is \$50.00.
