

Dedicated in 2004 to commemorate the 150th anniversary of the City's founding, Sesquicentennial Point is located on a hillside overlooking Clinton Lake and the Wakarusa Valley. The area provides a gathering space for groups and offers adjacent hiking trails and picnic areas.

The plaza near the top of the hill offers sweeping views of the City. Descending the hill, the Walk Through Time honors significant events in the history of the Lawrence community. A time capsule, to be opened in 2054, is buried next to the walkway.

You have the unique opportunity to become a part of the future by contributing to the development of Sesquicentennial Point, destined to become a community treasure.

The WALK THROUGH TIME follows the City of Lawrence's development from its founding in 1854 to the present day.

Each step represents people, families, organizations, businesses and important accomplishments in the history of Lawrence as a community.

The stones commemorate a significant year, and the histories that past experiences with future generations.

## SESQUICENTENNIAL POINT



### Directions to The Point:

From 23rd and Iowa Streets, go west on Clinton Parkway until you reach the road that crosses the Clinton Lake Dam, 900 E. Rd., and turn south.

Go south on 900 E. Rd. about 1/4 mile and take the first left, 902 E Rd.

Follow 902 E. Rd. toward the golf course, but watch for the sign that says Off Leash Dog Park.

Turn left(east) at the sign that says Off Leash Dog Park. Follow this road for about 1/4 mile.


On your left (north) you will see a beautiful grassy hillside. That is Sesquicentennial Point.
