What a relief it was when Delta Upsilon contracted with Josh's Montgomery's company four years ago for internet service. We went from daily drops in broadband width during high-use times to steady internet service. I am the House Director for a fraternity that is home to 72 men. Before we converted to internet through Wicked Broadband (formerly Lawrence Freenet) I could reliably access the internet only between 9 -11 in the morning and 1-3 in the afternoon. Since we subscribed to Wicked's service, I no longer lose my internet connection when the guys come back from class. Nor do they lose theirs when several people download large files at the same time. We are very pleased with our relationship with Wicked Broadband.

The internet feed is consistent, and the service is excellent. I am not a technophile: Josh and his staff are quick to respond to my questions, and take care of whatever is going on. Recently our UPS battery back-up aged out; they helped me identify what to order as a replacement, and were prepared to install it the day it arrived. They also tweak issues that they spot before I discover them (like a "hot spot" that was left unplugged in a study room over Thanksgiving). Typically I see them only when something external has happened to the system, like the squirrel that took out Phase 1 of our electrical service this fall. They are responsive and have become an integral part of the team that keeps this building running smoothly.



Dear Mr. Mayor, and City Commissioners:

I have forwarded the City of Lawrence my \$10 refund check from Wicked to support our need for Gigabit fiber in our city. Please accept my offer and consider supporting this project.

At issue is not cost of ramping up the project or whether the city could subsidize a project for residents, it's about the increasing cost of broadband access for businesses and residents. Cable companies are consolidating and these companies own the pipes carrying the internet into a vast majority of our homes - it's not the telcos and it's not the content providers. These cable companies are already starting to meter and put limits on the networks. The fewer cable providers there are, the more unified the rate structure becomes.

I do not consume much television, thus I have not had a need to pay for cable television in over 6 years, but I pay about \$100/month for access to broadband internet in my home. Both my wife and I telework from home three or more days each week, and our internet and cell phone bills are not subsidized by the companies who employ us. We stream programming for television via PBS, Hulu, ESPN3, C-SPAN, Netflix, etc.; and I subscribe to the MLB and NBA networks each sporting season. Some of this programming is free; some of this programming I choose to subscribe to. The cost of pipe access is what is inflated, not the programming.

Access to the appropriate amount of bandwidth is the crux for these experiences; not access to a cable provider throttling bandwidth through the most important pipe entering the dwelling (after power and water). The pipes and fiber are taxed with users and the plethora of devices they own and use at home, on the go, and across town when they dine or shuttle their children to activities.

Companies like Wicked and Google are driving down the cost of access to everyone's benefit: the City, residents and businesses.



Headquarters, Inc. has served this community since December of 1969 with free counseling available 24/7 to people of all ages. Thanks to a three-year federal award, we also serve the state with a variety of suicide prevention activities. However, the heart of our agency is the 24/7 counseling, which like any non profit program, must be supported through multiple funding sources and volunteerism.

Joshua Montgomery and his internet service have been generous supporters of our services since 2011. This support came at a critical time for our agency, when funding priorities for both the University of Kansas Student Senate and United Way of Douglas County were changing.

In January of 2013, Wicked Broadband began providing free high-speed internet to our agency. The donated services allow us to stretch our limited dollars to meet other needs. In addition, the quality of the internet service enhances our counseling and suicide prevention.

Our agency uses electronic record-keeping, an online database of health and human services for Douglas County residents, and a wide-range of pre-approved websites to provide information needed by our clients. We participate in and provide meetings and educational presentations using online services such as Skype and GoToMeeting. We are exploring the addition of live chat, text, and possibly video as additional technologies to provide our counseling to people who are more comfortable, or have more access to those communications tools.

Without the quality of internet service available to us through Wicked, and the donation of those services, Headquarters, Inc. would not be able to provide the quality of services available now, and in upcoming years. We urge you to consider this and the many ways that Wicked Broadband enhances the well-being of this community, as you consider their request for funding.
