Message from the Chief...



Rich Lockhart Chief of Police Lawrence, Kansas Since becoming your Police Chief in 2022, I've sincerely enjoyed getting out and meeting so many of you and listening and learning the Lawrence way. It's been my daily focus to help you and your family feel safe and secure by policing Lawrence the way you want to be policed.

It's always been a priority for me that your police department is visible and accessible to all of you. If you want to engage, you are welcome, but I also expect the department, at every level, to proactively provide information and reach out to people who may not have time or the inclination to seek it. From my command staff to the officers to civilian personnel, I want everyone out in the community building relationships and offering information.

Aligning with that vision, in 2023, I continued to increase the School Resource Officer Program and they've taken home the State of Kansas SRO of the Year award for the last 2 years. We began 2023 with a school tour educating high school students about the fentanyl crisis in partnership with the FBI and DEA. The SROs now run two Police Camps for ages 9-13 and two Teen Police Academies for ages 14–18. Numbers are in for our first full academic year of the "Handle with Care" program, which helps officers let teachers know if children have been touched by crime while still protecting their privacy, and we helped 105 children.

We applied and were one of 14 jurisdictions nationwide asked to participate in the Harvard Kennedy School Government Performance Lab's Alternative 911 Emergency Response Implementation Cohort -- a group leading the effort to find more effective ways to respond to 911 calls.

In 2023, we started handing out vouchers, rather than tickets, to fix some equipment violations with our Light's On partnership thanks to LKPD's Blue Santa.

I heard you when you said you wanted more protection downtown and implemented two dedicated downtown patrol officers, who've been making themselves known in the area and getting to know the business owners and those of you who, like my family and I, like to spend time there.

Thank you for allowing me to serve and I send my sincere gratitude to the officers, civilian professionals, and their families who serve alongside me to keep our town safe and secure.

Patrol Division



When the average member of the public sees a Lawrence Police Officer, chances are they are part of our Patrol Division. Its members are on the streets 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, and all holidays working to keep Lawrence safe and secure.

Lawrence officers are dispatched by the Douglas County Emergency Communications Center. In 2023, 53% of our calls were initiated by citizens and 47% were officer initiated while patrolling their assigned areas. The Patrol Division also includes specialty units like our Bike Patrol, Patrol Service Dogs, Accident Investigations, Unoccupied Aerial Vehicles, and Crisis Response Team.




LKPD commanders use "Quads" to assign officers specific areas to patrol in the city.

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
Quads were created using historical calls for service data to balance deployed resources throughout the city



Calls for Service

Total calls for service have remained relatively consistent through the past few years. Calls are prioritized in categories 1-9 to most efficiently use available resources and enhance the safety of the public and department members. Priority 1 calls are defined as those public safety calls that require the immediate presence of a law enforcement officer to protect individuals from injury in lifethreatening situations or other emergency situations that require and depend upon an immediate response.

Priority 1 Call Median Response Times



Response time includes the minutes and seconds from the time the call is received by dispatch to the time the officer arrives on scene. We call that measurement, "Hello to Hello".



Mental Health Co-Responder Team

2023 calls involving a mental health crisis

77% of LKPD officers are Crisis Intervention Team (CIT) Trained Our Mental Health Co-Responder Program embeds a Qualified Mental Health Provider within LKPD to provide the right intervention at the right time to prevent unnecessary arrests, decrease trips to the E.R. and reduce repeat calls. The team responds in-person to behavioral health calls to provide interventions once citizen safety has been established.

About halfway through 2023, Bert Nash opened the Treatment and Recovery Center, providing First Responders another resource to offer people experiencing mental health crisis.

LKPD's team conducts follow-up calls to individuals who had contact with law enforcement due to a behavioral health crisis, with the intention of getting the person the help they need to avoid future police contact.

Lawrence, KS: The Harvard Kennedy School Government Performance Lab (GPL) has selected Douglas County and the City of Lawrence as one of 14 jurisdictions nationwide to participate in their 2023-2024 Alternative 911 Emergency Response Implementation Cohort. It's an initiative designed to support city and county leaders in developing, improving, and expanding unarmed alternative responses to 911 calls.

Alternative teams have the potential to reduce overreliance on traditional law enforcement and resolving a crisis without creating unnecessary criminal justice system involvement.

Our community engagement and education efforts to combat the threat of fentanyl began early, in February, by joining forces with the FBI, DEA, and DA on a city-wide tour and heading to the high schools to talk about the dangers. 

The department's Patrol Service Dogs are credited with 45 apprehensions and 19 drug finds in 2023. K-9 Officers at LKPD are called Patrol Service Dogs for a reason. They're a part of the Patrol Division, ride along with their handlers daily, and they're the first to enter many dangerous situations. Their specific expertise, senses, and training quickly and effectively resolve threats or community dangers. Oftentimes, their simple presence can de-escalate a dangerous situation. 2023 saw the retirement of PSD "Cheeseburger" and the introduction of our newest member of the unit,

Unoccupied Aerial Vehicle Unit

2023 was the first full year of deployments after the Unoccupied Aerial Vehicle (UAV) Unit was introduced in March of 2022. In 2023, the team consisted of 16 FAA licensed pilots.

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2023 By The Numbers:

- 94 total aircraft deployments for active incidents
- 62 hours and 18 minutes of operational flight time for active incidents
- May was the busiest month, with 23 total incident deployments
- 886 training flights performed for over 100 hours of in-air training

Crisis Response Team

Established in 1980, the Crisis Response Team (CRT) is an area partnership amongst first responder agencies.

The team responds to crisis situations throughout the region and includes specially trained officers, negotiators, tactical medics, and counter snipers.

> CRT is comprised of expertly trained personnel from the Lawrence Kansas Police Department, Douglas County Sheriff's Office, Baldwin City Police Department and Lawrence Douglas County Fire Medical.

Investigations Division

In 2023, the Investigations Division, which consists of three specialized units, was assigned **734 cases** to investigate.

Special Victims Unit:

Investigates sexual and physical abuse cases including crimes against women, children, and dependent adults. The unit's detectives are supported by our victim's advocate and two civilian investigators.




Directed Investigations Unit:

Specially trained in gang-associated crimes, major drug distribution, robberies, and related crimes.

General Investigations Unit:

Detectives who investigate crimes including murder, kidnapping, robbery, battery, assault, and financial crimes.



Investigations Division of Pride

LKPD's Investigations Unit has both sworn and civilian experts in varying fields to help solve a wide array of crimes. In 2023, officers responded to three suspected homicides and called on investigators. They helped solve numerous aggravated assault cases and a kidnapping to help identify five suspects who were charged in federal court. Detectives also helped solve a vandalism case that was extremely costly for many residents of North Lawrence.

Fentanyl is a national crisis and in Lawrence. Drug experts from our investigations division spent a lot of time in 2023 educating students, teachers and parents about its dangers.

LKPD Investigations Personnel also work to help educate and prevent crime. Frauds experts in the department held multiple sessions for senior citizens about how to prevent financial fraud.

Victim Services & Domestic Violence

2023 saw dynamic growth and recognition of our victim services and domestic violence outreach programs.

Our Domestic Violence team includes our Victim Services Coordinator and an officer who review all domestic violence cases and provide resources and assistance to survivors/victims of domestic violence.

Officer Mark Hammond Domestic Violence Unit



In 2023, Natassia Records, our LKPD Victim Services Coordinator, was recognized as an Outstanding System-Based Advocate by the Kansas Attorney General for her work to improve domestic violence responses and help survivors of crime in Lawrence navigate the legal system. The creation and implementation of the Lethality Assessment Program (LAP) helps officers identify those at risk. The LAP is a research-based screening tool used in the field to help officers initiate appropriate action based on the results of the screening process.

Information Services Division

When most people think of the police department, they don't think about the vast amount of work done by our staff in Information Services.

The unit manages our secure network and services the many devices needed to perform policing duties, including body cameras, and in-car computer and camera systems. In February and March of

2023, the department transitioned to a new in-car video system, Axon Fleet 3, which works in conjunction with officers' body cameras to automatically activate in emergency situations.



Information Services is also responsible for disseminating public information adherent to the Kansas Open Records Act. Personnel fulfilled more than 2,000 open records requests in 2023 and processed over 200,000 documents into the department's report management system.



LKPD Property Room

LKPD E-cycled more than 1,100 pounds of electronics in 2023. Three civilian employees oversee all the property taken into the Lawrence Police Department. It is then stored, returned to its owners, or used in court proceedings.

> In 2023, 11,118 items were processed through the property room at the Lawrence Kansas Police Department.



After several hours of attempting to communicate with the person inside, a drone operator found the man deceased from an apparent selfinflicted gunshot wound.

Lawrence Police were called to a stabbing on May 21st where a woman was found with critical injuries, and also discovered the suspect has placed explosives in the home. The Leavenworth bomb squad assisted in securing the house, and the suspect was located and arrested approximately 12 hours later.

A 63-year old Lawrence man, wanted for a violent felony in Wichita, was safely taken into custody this afternoon following a prolonged standoff. Lawrence Police were notified around 11 p.m. Tuesday night that a suspect in a Wichita homicide was believed to be inside an apartment in the 1400 block of Bristol Terrace. While working to gather more information from our partners in Wichita, officers with our department set up a perimeter on the apartment building, and gathered information that led investigators to believe the suspect was present. Our Crisis Response Team was activated and responded to the area, as well our Crisis Response Negotiators and Unoccupied Aerial Vehicle team






Office of Professional Accountability Use of Force Reports

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The **Use of Force Review Board** reviewed all 18 reports and found in each case, officers' responses to resistance were reasonable and within department policy.

None of the reviewed incidents were related to complaints made by involved persons.

✓ Each incident was triggered by internal safeguards dictated by department policy.

2023 Complaint Process

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Complaint Filed with Department

Informal Process:

Any supervisor that can appropriately address the complaint can handle the inquiry.

If the complaint appears minor and non-repetitive or habitual, it will normally be forwarded to employee's Major who will conduct an informal investigation and make the appropriate disposition.

Link to Community Police Review Board

Complaint forwarded to the Office of Professional Accountability (OPA)

Anyone can file a complaint with the **OPA** including the subject of the incident, a bystander, a legal representative or an anonymous person.

The Lawrence Kansas Police Department will accept all complaints against the department or any of its employees, regardless of the subject or how it is received. Anonymous complaints will not be dismissed. Office of Professional Accountability Investigation

The **OPA** investigator will interview witnesses collect documents and prepare a report summarizing the

investigation.

At the conclusion of the investigation, all affected parties are notified in writing of the outcome.

OPA is responsible for formal investigations alleging a breach of policy, procedures, rules or regulations, and other non-criminal complaints

OPA will investigate all allegations pertaining to the Use of Force, Pursuit policies, or biased-based policing.

Racial or bias-based Complaint

Any complaint related to racial or other biasbased policing submitted to either the **Police Department or** the Board, if the complainant is unsatisfied with the **Police Department's** findings, the complainant may appeal the findings to the **Board**, in writing, within 14 days of receipt of notification of the department's findings for review by the Board.

LKPD Complaint Report

The Lawrence Police Department is committed to providing professional police service and requires a high standard of moral and ethical conduct.

84,523 Officer Responses

27 incidents resulted in complaints of varying levels

Two involved allegations of racial bias, which triggers review by the Community Police Review Board 1) Investigation still in process. The citizen believes they were given a citation during a traffic accident and the other driver was not because of race.

2) Withdrawn. The person withdrew the complaint after reviewing body camera video of the traffic stop (which resulted in a written warning) along with family members.

Of the 25 remaining incidents, two complaints were sustained

 Standard of Conduct (Level 1) Sustained – A civilian employee of the department was accessing criminal information beyond the scope of work duties. The employee is no longer employed at LKPD.

• Standard of Conduct (Level 1) Sustained An officer's computer error caused a warrant for theft to be incorrectly issued but never served for an out-of-town resident.

The 23 remaining incidents uncovered 29 potential complaints to consider and investigate. All were given a final disposition.

Final Dispositions:

Level 1: 7 Exonerated / 3 Unfounded

1 Not Sustained / 1 Withdrawn

Level 2: 2 Exonerated

Level 3: 11 Exonerated / 2 Unfounded

1 Not Sustained / 1 Inquiry
